## C.E.R.T. (COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM)

We are in the height of hurricane season and we thought it was important to remind everyone of C.E.R.T. and its responsibilities. We hope the following information will be helpful to our community. So far we have had a hurricane season that did not require our skills. Our hope is to never have to be activated but should a disaster strike, we will be ready to assist.

What is C.E.R.T and what does it do as defined by Florida Division of Emergency Management? "C.E.R.T. is a federally funded program through F.E.M.A. Its charge is "Assisting families and neighborhoods with preparation, response and recovery from major disasters in a neighbor-helping-neighbor spirit."

C.E.R.T. members are your friends and neighbors at Trailer Estates, trained to assist you in the event of a disaster. Members are trained by Manatee County Emergency Management under the direction of F.E.M.A. This is a Federal Freedom Corps program.

C.E.R.T. has the capabilities of communicating in an emergency. C.E.R.T members are continuing the training by adding new H.A.M. radio operators as well as holding drills to improve skills and efficiency. Historically the H.A.M. operators are the only ones that can communicate as electricity and cell towers are usually lost to us in a disaster. The H.A.M. operators will communicate with our web masters to get information out quickly for the Park web site. The Manatee County EOC is very pleased that we have put C.E.R.T. in place in our park.

The top priority for the team now is to provide information to our residents that will assist them in understanding the need to evacuate. The special needs residents' evacuation is a critical area of concern and more work to insure their safety in a timely manner is being addressed at the present time.

Zone maps of the park are now available. The zone maps are for the use of C.E.R.T. to sweep the park in an organized and efficient manner. Team members will have assigned areas of responsibility. This information will be available to all of you. Contact a C.E.R.T. member for assistance.

We are striving to be prepared at any time. We are still working on the system that allows C.E.R.T. to know who is living in the park at a given time. The team will be able to go through the park and give aide to those in need, not spend a lot of time going through empty homes and causing further damage not caused by the disaster.

C.E.R.T. members have picture ID that identifies them. Never answer questions of anyone that does not have proper ID.

The Team meets on the third Wednesday of the month, 10:00 AM in the Small Hall. We are always ready to listen to your ideas and suggestions for the safety of our residents. Should you have interest in joining this team of residents, please call Mary Huston or Ken Meierjurgan for more information.

Also, please come and join us at Crime Watch at 7:15 pm the 4th Tuesday of each month.

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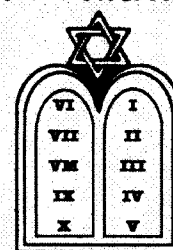

## S.A.F.E.

It's been a hot summer and we are all looking forward to the Fall being cooler. We will resume the S.A.F.E. meetings on Friday, September 4th in the Blue heron card room at 9:15 am. All are welcome.

We are not looking forward to several more months of hurricane season. Hopefully, we are all prepared. If you need any hurricane information call a S.A.F.E. representative. They will be happy to provide the needed information.

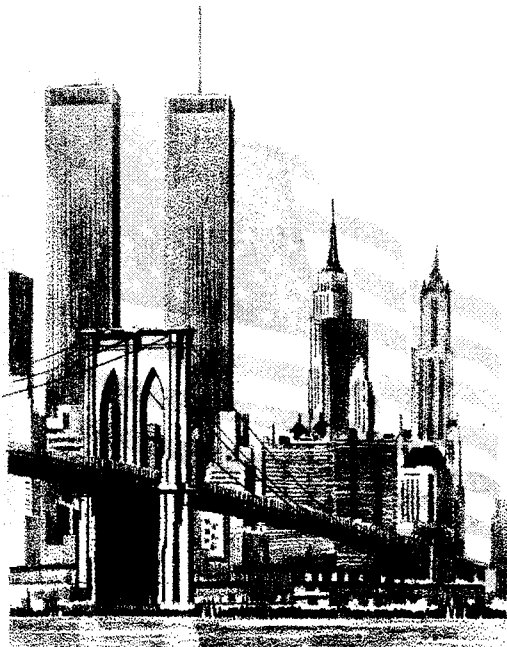
We are also threatened by the flu this fall—not only the “regular flu”, but the H1N1 flu virus (Swine Flu). Vaccines will be available for “regular flu”, but many of us will not be eligible to receive the H1N1 Vaccine due to our age. Check with your doctor or the Health Department for eligibility. Swine flu tends to be a virus that affects the younger age groups.

Because many of us will not be able to receive the vaccine, we must take precautions to avoid contracting the virus. Here are a few suggestions from the health experts at the CDC.

1. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. Then wash your hands with soap and water.
2. Also wash your hands thoroughly before eating and after using the bathroom.
3. Hand sanitizer and disinfectant wipes can be used frequently, especially for things like door knobs and shopping carts.
4. Avoid touching your face, especially the mouth, nose and eyes.
5. Avoid contact with people who are ill.
6. Don't spread the virus! (regular or swine flu). STAY HOME if you are ill! At least one week after symptoms appear or when symptoms are gone for 24 hours. Symptoms include fever, at least 101 degrees, cough and congestion.

If you become ill let a friend or S.A.F.E. member know so they can assist you in acquiring food, medicine and other comforts as needed for you recovery.

## Florida Drivers Must Stop for Blind Pedestrians

Florida is a highly urban state, with steadily increasing traffic and widening roads. Many residents and visitors find it a challenge to complete trips on foot. As a driver, it is your duty to exercise due care to avoid colliding with any pedestrian.

Think for a minute about the additional challenges that pedestrians with low vision face every day. There are about 500,000 sightimpaired pedestrians in Florida. Too many times these citizens are discouraged or prevented from completing a trip that requires crossing a major intersection.

If you have low vision, wouldn't you appreciate some courtesy and observance of the law by drivers? In Florida, it's not just a matter of courtesy; it's the law.

Florida drivers are required by law (Section 316.1301, Florida Statutes) to yield to blind pedestrians attempting to cross the street. Failure to do so is no longer a misdemeanor. It is a moving violation punishable by a fine.

In Florida when a blind pedestrian is at the edge of the curb or in the roadway, all drivers must come to a complete stop, even at a green light. In other words, they have the absolute right of way. Some blind persons are easy to identify by their use of a cane or guide dog, but others will not be easy to spot because they have partial sight and don't need a support device. However, it is your duty as a driver to drive in such a manner that you can recognize and yield to blind pedestrians.
